1. Vice Presidents Report

Archery NZ Strategic Plan

There were no updates to the Archery NZ Strategic Plan during 2017. The responsibility for the Strategic Plan will now pass to the new Vice President.

Policies that have been updated in 2017

Archery NZ Member Protection Policy – this has now been handed over to the appointed “Privacy Officer”

Archery Anti-Match Fixing & Sport Betting Policy. This now requires that all “Relevant Persons”, being:

- Archery NZ Executive Board members
- Commission Conveners
- Members of the Archery NZ Selection Panel
- Members of Archery NZ High Performance program
- Archery NZ appointed Officers, contractors & employees
- Archery NZ Members
- Archery Clubs with Archery NZ affiliated members
- Archery NZ accredited Coaches
- Archery NZ Judges at all levels
- Team Officials as part of Archery NZ representative or development teams
- World Archery members shooting events in New Zealand

and any other persons involved with Archery NZ activities to complete an Anti-Match-Fixing Education Program. In this case the Sport NZ “Match Fixing Education” is recommended and can be found on the Sport NZ website.

Sport NZ Funding

The first round of reporting under the new Sport NZ funding system was completed for the 1 July 2016 – 30 April 2017 period. Feedback was that the reporting was acceptable, but for future reporting we need to be providing more supporting documentation on our activities such as feedback forms from training courses for Coaches, Judges, other workforce and more detailed information on the demographics, numbers and increases in these areas in particular as well as having the information available on the Archery NZ website. We are preparing for the next round of reporting due 30th April 2018.

Website Upgrade

The website began its upgrade in August/September 2017, needed as it was developed and launched in 2010/2011. Many other apps and programs are being integrated with the website so we can run a more effective CRM system, tournament entry/results system, membership system etc which will improve our reporting capabilities and save so much double/triple handling of information.

Police Vetting

Since July 2017 there is now a charge of \$8.50 associated with Police Vetting our Team Officials predominantly for our Junior teams. Police Vetting has now been handed over to our police vetting officer and the privacy officer.

It has once again been a busy year for the VP role, made more so by attempting to get so many things completed prior to stepping down after 3 years in this position. I will however remain on as Selection Convener and the Sport NZ, HPSNZ & NZOC Liaison (outside of the Board). As Archery NZ has been continually pushed to become a far more professional NSO by our key stake-holders, the role of VP had become extremely large and extremely time consuming, so breaking some of the roles & responsibilities away from the VP role should assist the next person in the position.

I thank and appreciate that very small number of members that have acknowledged or thanked me for the work I have done on their behalf and for Archery NZ. I also appreciate those who volunteer, often time and time again to fill roles & positions that are important to the day to day activities of the Association and do so to give back to and for the betterment of our sport.

2. Commission Reports

2.1. Athletes Commission

(Marcus Barclay - Athletes Commission Convener)

Throughout 2017 Archery New Zealand received numerous request for information from the general public, through the use of our website. The subjects of these ranged from information about starting up a new archery club, taking safety precautions while practicing and locations of local clubs. It's great to see there is still an interest amongst the general public of various ages to still be involved on some level in archery.

Archery New Zealand also was lucky enough to send archers overseas to represent us on the world stage, with Archers: Sam Hudson and Elizabeth Randle competing at the 2017 Summer Universiades over in the heat of Taipei. Once again Barbara Scott showed her determination and commitment to the sport and represented Archery New Zealand in Mexico at the World Archery Championships. Darren Day and Mike Savage proved that they were able to shoot with the best, as they did us proud over at the World Archery 3-D championships in France.

Once again the Archery New Zealand league series, which is kindly run by Steve Clifton proved to still be popular among archers, with an outdoor and indoor series run. It's great to see sponsors taking this opportunity to support archers a swell, with prizes offered from Easton, Doinker, Hoyt and Pats Archery. As Well as Attitude Archery already confirming their involvement for next year's series.

Nationally it was encouraging to see clubs running tournaments, to benefit the development of archers and provide them with opportunities to gain PB scores or practice matchplay. Once again we thank Manawatu Archery Club for running another Indoor Nationals and keeping the standard so high. Also a big thank you goes out to the Rotorua Archery Club and Lakeview Archers for stepping up and



giving the Juniors their Nationals, after entries were capped at 2017 Archery New Zealand outdoor Nationals. Feedback has been overwhelmingly positive and grateful.

Last but not least to the Massey University Archery Club for taking on the challenge to run the 2018 outdoor nationals, best of luck.

From April 20th-30th New Zealand ran the world masters games. It was wonderful to see so many archers from so many countries enjoying competing and spending time in New Zealand. I think most people would agree that the LOC ran a great world class tournament for everyone to enjoy.

I'd like to wish everyone best of luck with their shooting for the coming year whether it be national or international events, I look forward to seeing everyone competing.

I'd like to thank the District Reps for all their hard work over the last year and previous years. Their motivation and dedication to helping our coaches and archers deserves recognition.

Having completed in some cases more than a one full term in the positions a lot of the Coaching Panel are looking to pass on the roles to other enthusiastic Coaches looking to take up a challenge.

We need coaches to fill the ADAA and ECBOPAA positions as well as someone wanting to take on the Convener role. Jordan Taylor is also stepping down for WAA and has been replaced by Gavin Blakemore.

Working with the Coaching Panel has been enjoyable for me and has shown the benefits that can be obtained from getting coaches to work together.

Due to a number of factors including running World Master Games, National Championships, ill health and family / work commitments not all planned activities have been run in all District but detailed below are the activities run.

Archery NZ Coach Training Courses



Coach Training Courses have been run in Dunedin, Christchurch, Tauranga and Hamilton.

As of November, we had 162 Archery NZ accredited coaches, 2 Performance Coaches, 82 Development Coaches and 78 Foundation Coaches (54 being non Archery NZ members).

District Reps will coordinate the running of courses but we need to know where they are needed so we urge prospective coaches to register interest via the website and not wait for courses to be advertised.

We have secured funding to help facilitate these courses and can provide course tutors so if you know of a need for a course or a group interested in becoming accredited coaches please let us know. Remember the Foundation Coaching Course can be taken by non Archery NZ members who have not had previous archery experience but are actively wanting to act as instructors for camps / clubs etc.

Unfortunately the planned Performance Coach course was unable to run but it is hoped that it will soon and that those taking the course will consider working to become course tutors so making the course more accessible.

Junior Disability Games + Para Archery

We again ran a one day archery event for the Halberg DSF Junior Disability Games on Saturday 7th October 2017 at King's College, Auckland. This year we had a fantastic turnout of coaches and helpers from all over the North Island that came to help run the event for disabled young people with ages ranging from 8 to 21 years.

This year saw a large increase in those wanting to take part in the competitive part of the day with archers competing in an Olympic style head to head shoot-off. The event challenges you as a coach but you will never see so many smiles (from the coaches as well as the archers!)

We hope to continue support for this yearly event and any clubs or coaches wanting to get involved are encouraged to contact the Coaching Panel.

Paralympics NZ, Halberg DSF and the Parafeds are now well aware and supportive of the work we want to do with Para-archers. So if this is an area that interests you or your athletes please get in touch with the Panel.

High Performance

A High Performance workshop was held with the support of HP Sport NZ and a Strategic HP Plan was formulated.

The Board of Archery NZ have appointed a HP Working group to progress the HP programme and look at ways of implementing the HP strategic plan.



The Coaching Panel will continue to support the programme but appreciate this being handed to a dedicated team allowing the Panel to focus on Coaching needs.

National Coaching Program

The Coaching Panel backed by the Board of Archery NZ are constantly looking to improve what we do.

The re-accreditation system is being re thought as it is proving too time consuming and not addressing its' main purpose, which is to keep coaches engaged and better supported by us by keeping information up to date

Constructive feedback and ideas are always welcome so please keep the conversation going on how best we as a commission can work together to support our archers.

I'd like to thank you the coaches for the work and dedication I know goes into supporting our athletes in the sport we love.

To continue the progress made and make use of the funding secured we need your support and involvement.

2.3. Youth Commission

(Petra Baker – Youth Commission Convener)

Youth National Championships:

A highlight of the year for Youth Archery in 2017 was the Inaugural Youth Archery Championships in October.

Rotorua Archery Club, in conjunction with Lakeview Archers (field event) ran an incredibly well organised event. The tournament ran smoothly and it was great to see so much care and thought given to ensuring our youth archers had the opportunity to experience a world class event.

A highlight was the match play event where Gold medal finals were hosted on a separate finals venue allowing the archers to experience commented, live streamed, head to head match play. An incredible opportunity and experience for our developing athletes.

Thank you to all involved in the running and organisation of this wonderful event.

Name Change:

As you may notice JAMA is now referred to as Youth Archery. This change has been made to better reflect our athlete base and remove confusion around what "JAMA" actually means. This change has long been discussed and we are happy to see the new terminology being phased in.

Congratulations to Samuel Hudson and Elizabeth Randle on representing New Zealand and the Universiade Championships in Taipei this year.

It is encouraging to see a continued pathway of development and international representation available for our youth archers as they move into university.

University Archery League:

2017 saw the introduction/trial of a new university archery league postal shoot. This again was developed as a method of continuing to engage archers in the sport as the transition into university. There were two universities and a small number of athletes who participated in this event in 2017 with Canterbury University beating Auckland University in the cup.

Moving forward we are hoping to grow the number of students engaging in this postal shoot with a view of working towards official UTNZ sanctioning and national events. In order to make this possible we need representation in the postal shoot from at least four different tertiary organisations so this will be a continued goal moving forward.

Trans Tasman Championships 2018

It is great to see such interest in the 2018 TT event with a number of athletes seeking qualifying scores and expressing interest in this event which will be hosted in Australia in March 2018. It is encouraging to see that there is an increasing number of Youth Athletes who are achieving qualifying scores across a range of divisions. This is a significant indication that the future of our sport remains bright and we look forward to seeing New Zealand field a strong team against the Australians next year.

Whilst the change in format for the 2018 TT event is a significant departure from past events we believe this change to 72 arrow rounds & Match play events (including team and mixed team match play) is a positive step forward for the event as it brings the tournament in line with the International competitive format. This means our youth archers will receive relevant and appropriate competition experience in this important development event.

We are happy to see an early appointment of a strong Management/Coaching team for this event which we hope will ensure good communication, organisation and support for the Youth athletes who are successfully selected for this event.

2.4. Judges Commission

(Colin Mitchell - Judges Commission Convener)

At our last Judges' AGM our judging stalwart, Carole Hicks stood down from her duties within Archery New Zealand, to concentrate on her role as chair of the World Archery Para committee.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Carole for her many years of hard work and dedication to Archery New Zealand and especially that within the Judges' Commission.



The year started off with the Judges' Commission getting approval from the Board to instigate a new system to train and progress our judges through the system. Whilst quite a lot of background work has gone into this, we are not as far progressed as I would like, due to the fact that I personally spent a large part of the year waiting to be called up for an operation. This meant that I was unable to plan and book meetings with the judges that were needed to progress this forward. This is certainly still on the project list for this coming year.

As most of you will be aware, earlier this year ANZ hosted the Archery competition for the World Masters Games, and this proved to be a most valuable experience not only for the archers, but also our Judges and officials. A huge thank you to the seven ANZ Judges who gave up their time to judge during the week-long event. It was also great to be able to have our numbers boosted by three Judges from Australia, and one Judge from Tahiti. Thank you all guys!!

It has been a challenging year with clubs wanting to host tournaments, but with us only having a small number of Judges to cover these events, we find that some Judges are being called on almost on weekly basis. This situation is compounding as judges find that trying to juggle judging duties with family time is becoming more and more difficult. This has led to the recent resignation of two of our Judges in the Lower North Island area, as well as one of our Judges from that area leaving for overseas, and has put real pressure on our resources.

Anne as acting Treasurer has been most proactive in the chasing up of outstanding Judges' Levies and this has resulted in a much better recovery of funds that are owing to Archery New Zealand. This should result in us being able to put more resources into Judge recruitment and training. Thank you Anne for this work.



3. Officer Reports

3.1. Ranking Administrator

(Patrick Biggs)

For the period from October 2016 to the end of September 2017, my main activity as Ranking Administrator has been to continue to provide an up-to-date ranking list as close to the start of the following month as possible, as well as a major piece of work to automate the output of the ranking tables. Sometimes the former activity has slipped a little due to work and life pressures, for which I apologise. The ranking data from 2011 onwards is available on the ArcheryNZ website.



Years listed are the October of that year, and represent the results from the shooting calendar year from October to

In terms of tournaments and rounds shot, for the period October 2016 to the end of September 2017, there have been 92 events and 1,985 rounds shot by archers, an increase in events, but a slight decrease in rounds shot from last year's 77 and 2,051 respectively. So, in the last year, there have been more, but on average, smaller events. Let's hope that is just an anomaly, as the trend over the last few years has been both more events and rounds shot. This got me thinking, so you can see a graph opposite that shows this trend over the last few years for the numbers of completed rounds and tournaments.

The observant amongst you will have noticed that the rankings from April 2017 onwards – to mark the 100th month of results in the system – appeared with a very different format. This is the first step in the “grand plan” to automate the whole ranking process (but that's still years away). I spent a long time coding a new process that allows me to generate automatically formatted ranking tables using a tool called LaTeX some of you may have heard of. Up to now, I have been doing the final rankings by hand in Excel, and then manually making PDFs. 2017 was also the year I wanted to include ArcheryNZ membership numbers in the rankings at some stage, but due to a number of factors, and the effort to automate the ranking outputs, this will have to go on the backburner for 2018.

This next paragraph would be for my annual plea about tournament results, and the format they get delivered in. It's still here, as there is now increasing – but not complete – use of the new Excel (.xlsx) results template, which is making things easier for me to process, so thank you to those of you who are adopting the template. I again reiterate that this template, and tab-delimited IanSEO output (no more PDFs please) is the only acceptable results format for me to work with into 2018. Some tournament organisers will attest to the fact that I have returned results not on the template, so please use the (hopefully) user-friendly Excel template. My work patterns show no sign of changing into 2018, consequently, I will not have the hours it takes to either process PDFs, or email tournament organisers on a monthly basis.

However, one thing that has not changed is that I still do not get sent every result, despite mentioning this in every annual report, and it being clearly stated on the ArcheryNZ Tournament Completion Form that I – as Ranking Administrator – should receive a copy of the results from every tournament. Thank you once again to all those of you who do send me the results. I hope that 2018 and the new Excel template reinvigorates tournament organisers to send me the results directly, but only in .xlsx format (no PDFs please). I continue to monitor the major

international events (World Cups and events for which archers have been selected), though if you have shot overseas in a tournament, please send me a link to, or the results, yourself. Some people do this for me already, and it is a great help, and thank you for that.

I am always open to comments and suggestions to make the ranking system better or clearer, so please contact me at the usual address (on the ranking results) if you have any ideas.

3.3. NZ Postal League Coordinator (Kerry Hoole)

Summer Postal League

I hope everyone enjoyed the Competition. So without further ado, here is a run-down of the results.

So starting at Division 6

This had been dominated by Lakeview A up until February when they unfortunately had a bit much on and defaulted which left the door open for Marangai B to sneak ahead and take the number one position. So Lakeview got second with Randwick C in third. But don't dismay Lakeview A you will be going up to Division 5 as well due to an extra gap in the draw in Division 3

In Division 5 Rosebank dominated throughout the season with a clean sweep, with Christchurch C coming in second and Mountain Green C third.

Division 4 also saw a clean sweep this time by Marangai A, But with Mt Green B hot on their tails and Randwick B in Third. But worth noting Marangai A got the highest accumulated score outside division 1 and 2 coming in 8th in the total scores stakes (see below).

Division 3 was taken out by Randwick A with Timaru A in second and Whakatane in third. Congratulations Randwick

So now, Division 2, and this was a battle between Greenwood and Mt Green A with it coming down to the final month with Mt Green managing the win to equalise the total points at 14 but winning on total score having 12517 points to Greenwoods 12153. Worth mentioning Mt Greens total score was the 3rd highest in the League.

And Finally Division 1 and the league winners.

Auckland A got the highest total score of 12571, but unfortunately for them lost their most crucial match against Christchurch A, so congratulations go to [the Christchurch A Team](#) and the League trophy is heading South.

3.5. Webmaster (Caro Geelen)

This year I took over the webmaster role from Yiftach Swery. For the most part this consists of uploading documents to the website, uploading new events and sending out news articles. There are some days and weeks which are much busier than others!

I was fortunate this year to be involved in the planning of the upgrade to the website. The new website layout is much more flexible, mobile friendly and the operations of the back of the website makes it easier to upload items and make edits when they are needed.

The navigation is still a work in progress, as is the updates to the events page, but we are hopeful that in the coming year we will get this right, as well as a really

unique, amazing way to view, register and enter tournaments – hopefully all online!

3.6. Editor (Caro Geelen)

This year marked the eventful moment where we went from a printed magazine to an online magazine due the cost of printing and postage, which was increasing issue to issue to a level we could not match, and without enough advertising in the magazine to pay for this. The readership of the magazine was also dropping off, with fewer and fewer people subscribing to the printed magazine (except for a very loyal bunch – I thank all of you for your support!)

The difficult decision was made to move the magazine completely online, on the website we had already established a few years prior:
<http://magazine.archerynz.co.nz>. All subscribers were moved to the website, and given a login and password. The final issue was printed, which happened to be the honour issue for Corey Turner, who was a very passionate archer and a dedicated follower of the magazine.

Any new subscribers could now subscribe for the reduced fee of \$10 a year, and this resulted in a lot of my old subscribers who had deemed the cost earlier too much coming back to the magazine. The benefit of course is that the last twenty issues are online, so they were able to access some of the magazines they had missed! In which case the overall subscribers increased, which was really promising.

At the time of writing this we have had one online magazine, with a wonderful readership, although we have yet to have every subscriber log in and check it – so I wonder if anyone is stuck logging in, please contact me through editor@archerynz.co.nz and I can help reset your password so you can access the magazine.

We have also started to use the website to showcase some of the amazing writing we have had over the years and publish (freely accessible to anyone) articles by some of our great contributors. We have had a really fantastic response to these articles and are planning to continue to do this over the next year. The website is going to become a repository for the online magazine and these showcase articles, and we hope that people can use them as a resource if they need them. With titles such as “Shooting at Home” and “Aiming at the Centre Again” they are all ready for archers to learn more about archery and encourage them to subscribe to the magazine to get more, updated articles.

In regards to my job, going fully online has made my job a lot easier, and has resulted in you getting the magazine a lot faster. Instead of having to wait for the print run, then pack and post, and waiting for the post to get to you, as soon as the magazine is published online you can log in and view it on any device. All the magazines can be downloaded by anyone who has a subscription, so if you desire a printed copy you can get one that way (as well as printing out a copy for your

club, perhaps?) The PDFs are “print-ready” so you should be able to take them to a copy shop and get them to print it as a booklet if you need it.

Teams Selected in 2017:

2017 would be the least number of Representative Teams/Archers that Archery NZ has selected for a number of years. Intentions to Apply started off well, but gradually were withdrawn by archers and very few Event Registration Forms were submitted. The Selection Panel had gone to an A & B qualification score and dropped the number of scores required from 4 to 3, but it appears that this was not successful in assisting more archers to qualify for representation.

- Archery NZ had no representation at any of the World Cups 2017
- 1 archer, Barbara Scott applied & was selected for World Championships Mexico
- 2 archers, Elizabeth Randle & Samuel Hudson applied & were selected for the World Universiade in Taipei and travelled with Team Manager Marcus Barclay
- 2 archers, Mike Savage & Darren Day applied and were selected for the World 3D Championships in France.

So while we had representation at 2 events that Archery NZ has not had representation at for many years, the usual events had little or none.

Trans Taman 2018:

At the time of writing this there had been a number of "Intentions to apply" submitted and the Selection Panel hope to see many more so we can have a larger team for 2018.

Early appointment of Team Manager & Coach was made to ensure that a Training Camp could be planned and attended by those selected prior to the event. Feedback from 2016 from many of the TT archers was that they felt a training camp would have help their organisation & training leading up to the event and their performance at the event itself along with improving the "Team" culture.

2018 Youth Olympics – Buenos Aires

- Athletes born between 1 January 2000 and 31 December 2003

The Continental Qualifying Tournament (CQT) for the Youth Olympic Games will be hosted by New Caledonia during the Oceania Championships 9th – 13th July 2018.

At the time of writing this report the NZOC has just this week sent through details for the Nomination Policy and the Archery NZ Nomination Policy & Criteria is being worked on and hopefully released by the time you read this.

2020 Olympics

At this stage we have not received the NZOC requirements for nomination to enable us to finalise the Nomination Policy & Criteria for this event, but the meetings with NZOC have been beneficial and we hope that the nomination policies moving forward will not be as daunting as in the past.

Moving forward:

A proposal was put to the Board by the Selection Convener to drastically change the method of selection for representative archers. A move away from a Policy & Criteria for each and every event to a "Selection Shoot" system to enable Archery NZ to have a "Team" that is could then better supported with training camps prior to events, gain sponsorship and/or funding and have key events being targeted was proposed. The proposal eventuated in many skype meetings to discuss resulting in not Selection Panel members supporting it. As a result the proposal then went to the Board where it was apparent there were opposing sides for the support (or not) of the proposal. Some compromises were suggested, but this has left Selection with a foot in both camps so to speak, Selection Event for World Cup Stage 1 only and MQS system for other senior target international events and in the view of the Selection Convener is not the ideal long term outcome for the selection process, but rather than have no change to a system that is clearly not working for the archers it is hopefully a step in a positive direction until a High Performance Manager/National Coach is appointed and the HP Programme implemented. So I ask that you all give this change a chance, work with us, not against us so we can review this approach and improve it further for the future.

We believe that the system gives all archers an equal chance at representing Archery NZ at senior events in 2018.

It needs to be mentioned that Archery NZ is committed to treating all of our members equally, this includes the Selection process. We are happy to discuss suggestions that will improve the processes and be to the benefit of ALL those who may be seeking selection.

One of my significant areas of concern is the increasing difficulty in securing Team Officials, and while the senior archers do not require an official to compete overseas, it does help them focus on their performance rather than the details of the event organisation and give them added support. With our junior teams, they are not able to travel without Team Officials. The earlier officials apply for and are appointed the more chance there is of obtaining funding for the team which can help considerably. And while Archery NZ would dearly love a dedicated Funding person, no one has stepped forward for this position like so many other positions that are still currently vacant.

3.10. Registrar (Ruth Thompson)

After taking over this role only in June from the previous Registrar I would to thank Patsy Vercoe for her ongoing support. The box of pins has been collected from PTS Logistics in Christchurch.

The stock take that was provided to me has been checked and I can confirm is correct. Since taking on the role up to the end of September there has been one claim which brings the total from the stock take from 1175 – 1174.

As the Summer Season has started there are more claims rolling in and this will be reflected in my next report.

I look forward to working with the Board.

3.11. Youth Awards Registrar (Rachel Hughes)

Pins/Badges

This year has shown a reduced amount of indoor and outdoor badges being claimed, while the numbers of postal badges claims has increased. Part way through the year the board required a stock take be taken which is being updated every time a claim is received. The stock take is showing that we currently have a sufficient number of badges, but an order will be needed either part way through or after the summer season is complete.

Trophies

At the Youth Outdoor Nationals the Most improved trophies for 2015 and 2016 were awarded to the appropriate archers to reward their hard work over the last two years. A trophy order was placed for the 2017 year and will be awarded at the Outdoor Nationals.

The Most Improved Female/Male Compound/Recurve trophies are determined by the monthly postal shoots. Archers are allowed to miss one month in the year, unless the pool is small (such as the female compound division). The lowest score is subtracted from the highest score and the individual with the greatest difference is the most improved for the year.

Important Note

It is important that everyone makes sure they have the most current version of the claim form throughout the year. I have moved twice over the last two years and have had emails asking about my address when people receive returned letters. If you do not send claims to the correct address you may not receive your claim.

Apology

Apologies to anyone who has not received any emails from the awards registrar over the last year, there seems to have been a problem somewhere with the emails. Archery New Zealand is looking into this problem and will hopefully solve it soon.


At the time of preparing this report (19 November 2017) affiliations for the 2017-2018 season stand at 378 members.


There were a total of 600 registered members for the 2016-2017 Membership Year compared with 604 for the 2015-2016 Membership Year.


Stats ex 2016-2017 membership database current to 30 September 2017

Age groups as per age in 2017







2016-2017 ArcheryNZ Membership Groups by Gender



2016-2017 ArcheryNZ Membership by Ethnicity




2016-2017 ArcheryNZ Membership Returning versus New by Group








2016-2017 Membership - ADAA
